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FROM THE PASTOR

Our trip to Haiti at the beginning of May was filled with mixed emotions, especially for those who had never been before. I am sure you have heard from some of our members who made the trip and we will most likely have a time when we can show some of our pictures and reflect on the experience in more detail. I think all of us were amazed at how much remains to be done to clean up collapsed buildings and help people get out of tents into some better type of shelter.

While there is much to yet be done, I had the advantage of having been to Haiti with our first Conference team last June. I was able to see some progress, fewer tents lining the streets and less in some of the fields on our drive out to Petit Gouve. The biggest difference I saw was the church in Fond Doux. Last June we were passing five gallon buckets filled with concrete to pour the foundation. When we arrived this time, I saw an almost completed structure! The local workers were applying a final coat of concrete to the outside walls and putting in the metal work in the windows. The building was completely enclosed and they were talking about how they were going to finish the inside of the sanctuary. There was much enthusiasm by members of that community that they could anticipate the church once again being open.

Of course, we all know the church is more than a building. It is the community of the faithful gathered and involved in ministry together, sharing their discipleship with one another and the wider community. We saw glimpses of what the church meant to the people of Fond Doux and experienced what the Methodist Church in Haiti was doing.

Many of the churches run schools. There is no free public education in Haiti, so the church is a leader in educating the children. It is a difficult task, even more-so since the earthquake because many people do not have the money to send their children to school. But many sacrifice so that the children might have a better chance as they

grow older. One of the biggest problems the churches face with the schools is that with the loss of revenue, teachers have not been paid on time, or in some cases at all.

A number of the churches also have health clinics. We brought a large duffle bag of medications along with us and took them to another church and had an opportunity to visit with the nurse who staffs the clinic. Her biggest wish was that there was money enough to have a doctor visit at least one or two days a week to treat some of the more serious cases she sees. But the good news is that the church's clinic is able to help a number of people in the more rural area – a real blessing.

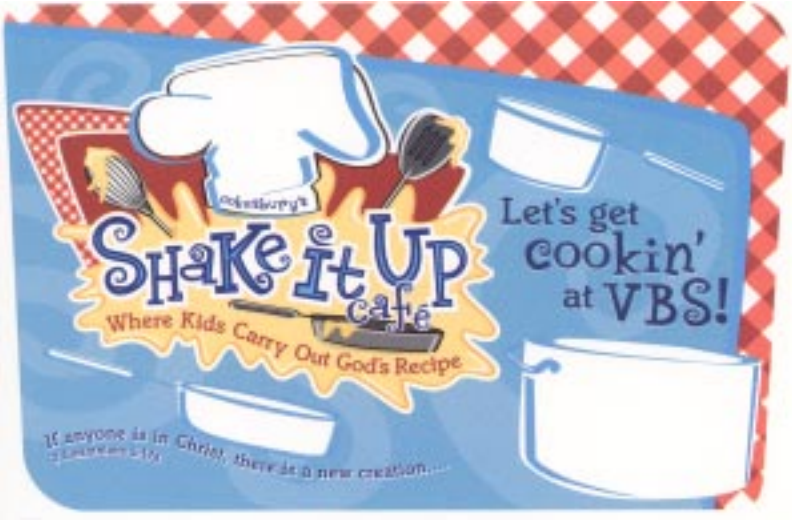
As I think about the month of June, I think about how the church at large and in particular our church in Clinton is reflecting the love of Christ in all we do, each and every day. This month we will be reminded of our connectional system as Annual Conference takes place at Hofstra University. Everyone is invited to attend on Saturday for the mission celebration which will include a recognition of those who have volunteered in Haiti. The day after is Pentecost and we will be celebrating confirmation and the reception of new members. It is a very special day as our young people confirm their baptismal vows and others make a formal commitment to be members of our church and with all others support it with their prayers, their presence, their gifts, their service and their witness. This signifies the central reason for being: making disciples of Jesus Christ.

The following week we will celebrate our children and our youth as they lead us in worship and let us know some of the things they have learned in Sunday School. Later in the month they and others will be taking part in Vacation Bible School, a time of fun and learning and outreach to other children in our community.

These are just some of the ways we respond to our calling to be in ministry. As we saw in Haiti and as well as in Clinton, the church can and does make a difference in people's lives. By the grace of God we can continue to reach out and share the gospel in word and deed wherever the Spirit may lead us. Thanks be to God.

Haiti one year after the earthquake

Prior to the January 12, 2010 earthquake, the United Methodist Volunteer In Mission network was sending approximately one hundred teams per year to Haiti. The UMC members of Clinton were generous contributors to staffing a hospital in the mountains. At the time of the earthquake persons were there from New York, North Carolina, Florida, Dakotas, Detroit, Texas and New Jersey Conferences. Sam Dixon, the top executive of the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) and Clinton Rabb, head of Mission Volunteers died when their hotel collapsed around them.

A V.I.M. team from the Greater New Jersey Conference is renovating the Methodist Children's Home orphanage and the deaconess' home next door in Port-au-Prince. Teams from the New York Conference have been rebuilding a church in Petit Goave.

UMCOR continues to ask for relief kits (bedding, birthing, cleaning, health, layette, school, and sewing) and contributions to the Haiti Emergency Advance #418325.

Historic June dates

Philip Otterbein and Martin Boehm were the first bishops of the United Brethren in Christ. That's where the "United" in our church name comes from. Otterbein was born on **June 3, 1726** in Nassau, Germany.

On **June 7, 1844**, the General Conference meeting in New York, adopted a plan of separation for the Methodist Episcopal Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

John Wesley, founder of the Methodist movement, was born in an Anglican Rectory in Epworth, England on **June 17, 1703**.

Juneteenth commemorates the end of slavery in the United States on **June 19, 1865**. Although Abraham Lincoln had signed the Emancipation Proclamation on January 1, 1863, it wasn't until Union General Gordon Granger and some 2,000 troops reached Galveston, Texas that all slaves were liberated. What began as a celebration of the event in Texas in 1866 has now spread throughout the United States.
