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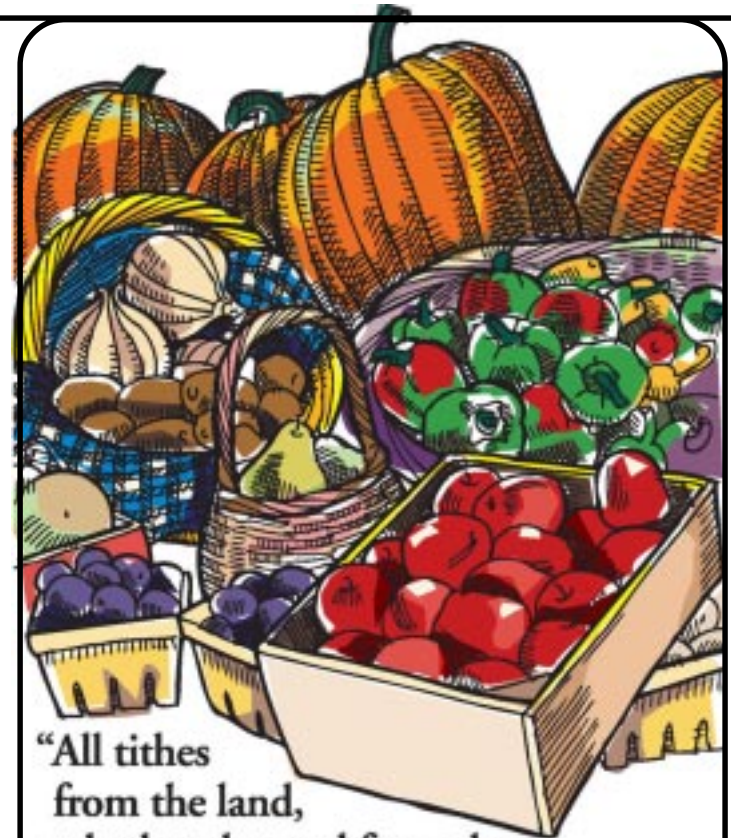

As we head into our nation's season of Thanksgiving, I have encouraged the Stewardship Committee to use the Sunday before Thanksgiving as our "Commitment Sunday." Not only are we dedicating our pledges for 2011 on that day, but we are receiving new members as well. I think it fits well with our seasonal theme of thanksgiving, though for Christians every day is a day of thanksgiving!

Why do you give to the church? Take a little quiz: pick the top two reasons for your giving:

- 1) The **Bible** (the church's teaching of what the Bible instructs us to do).
- 2) Sense of **Duty**
- 3) **God's work in the world**
- 4) **Gratitude** for God's love and goodness
- 5) **Gratitude for help**
- 6) **Leader's Urging**
- 7) Sense of **Obligation**
- 8) **Specific Needs**
- 9) **Tax benefits**

The U.S. Congregational Life Survey research found that the most important was gratitude for God's love and goodness. Almost half of those surveyed said that this was a major influence on giving decisions. The second was to support God's work in the world. Duty, the Bible, and sense of obligation round out the top five. As you noticed, nowhere in that list was anything to do with a budget!

We give because we are thankful and we believe in the work that the church is doing in the community and the world in the name of Jesus Christ. I am so grateful that we as a church continue to look beyond ourselves and support ministries in and around Clinton as well as worldwide. From the Soup Kitchen to supporting a theological student in Mozambique, we sense we are in ministry. Our commitment is undergirded by our gathering in worship in our beautiful building with our wonderful choir and organist and all the many people who participate in leadership rolls during our service. People volunteer their time to make sure that we have a program for our children to learn our Christian story and begin to learn what it means to live a Christian life. We have a wonderful support staff that keeps the building in

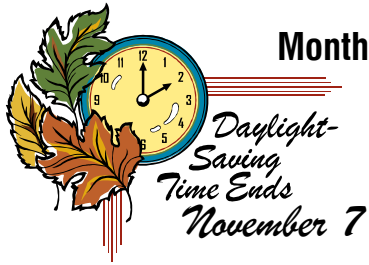

## Memorial funds

Sometimes the church gets a small check in memory of a loved one who had no connection with our church and sometimes we get hundreds of dollars in memory of someone who was very active in church worship and activities.

How does the Memorial Committee decide how to spend these funds? When we needed a small amount to complete the sanctuary sound system, we used some of those smaller undesignated amounts. Now we have almost \$1,000 in memory of Gale Miller which is designated for a bell gazebo.

The Ladies Sewing Society of our church raised \$1,119 to purchase a bell from the Meneely Bell Foundry in West Troy, NY in 1871. The bell weighs 2,000 pounds and has a 48 inch diameter. In 1998 the last portion of the old tower was removed and the bell placed between the church and parsonage. The bell is now worth over \$60,000 and needs housing to protect it from vandalism and unscheduled ringing.

A building plan and of course, more money is needed for this project. Would you care to be on a committee - hopefully for a short term - to plan and raise funds to protect the bell? If so, please talk to Trustee Beverly Jones or Sue Alexander of the Memorial Committee. We would like to have your input.

## The Transplant Games

The National Kidney Foundation holds U.S. Transplant Games every two years. The 2010 Games were held in Madison, Wisconsin from July 30 to August 4. The primary reason for the Games is to provide a way for the transplant recipients to honor their donor or donor's families by demonstrating that with their gift of life the recipients are strong and healthy enough to participate.

As I reflect on attending the games a few months back, we had a wonderful time. Being a kidney recipient on December 7, 2007, this was my first year in the games. I took part in the 5K walk. That was about 3.3 miles with my husband, Ken as my supporter. He has been there all the way for me. We did not finish first, nor did we come in last. We had a time of one hour, fourteen minutes, twenty-two seconds. I also took part in Bowling for Singles and enjoyed being with other people from many states. I did nothing to brag about; the main thing was that I did it!

We attended many workshops and listened to many donor family stories that were heartfelt as to how the donor's organs and tissues had saved so many lives. One family said their loved one saved fifty-one lives through donating organs and tissue. We learned that a deceased donor can give much more than just a kidney.

We also attended the Quilt Pinning where families could honor their loved ones by making a 12 x 12 inch square with favorite colors and mementoes along with names and verses. The finished quilts are about 7 x 12 feet and they are currently working on the 37th quilt. All of them were on display in a large room of the Monona Terrace.

The games are in the Summer Olympic format: ballroom dancing, basketball, badminton, bowling, golf, track and field, racquetball, swimming, table tennis, tennis and volleyball and are open to any organ recipient or living donor. All states were represented by a team; some of the teams had more than one state - like Team Mo-Kan was from Missouri and Kansas. The size of the teams varied from six to over a hundred.

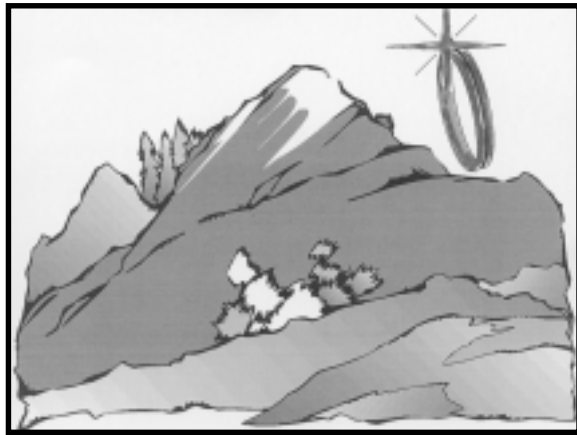
